We are grateful for the residents of Northern Virginia who provided input on transportation priorities throughout the public engagement period of Phase I of our TransAction update. Sharing your commuting experiences and your continued engagement are invaluable as we plan NoVA's transportation future. We'll be sure to announce more public input opportunities in the coming year as the updates to TransAction and the Six Year Program continue.

As another oversubscribed Six Year Funding Program Update is upon us, it is imperative that the Authority's revenues are fully restored. It's a top legislative priority not only for the Authority but for our member jurisdictions as well. For our economy to continue to flourish, we must have a robust, multimodal transportation network that meets the needs of the region. The transportation needs are there, but the funding to adequately address the needs are not. The passage of the \$1 trillion Bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act by U.S. Congress in November was a huge step in addressing long-standing transportation challenges impacting the nation and communities across Virginia. It is my hope that funding from the federal bill coupled with transportation investments made by the Authority, will continue to improve the quality of life for Northern Virginians, allowing them to spend more time doing the important things and less time commuting. FY2022-2027 SIX YEAR PROGRAM

IT TAKES A REGION TO KEEP NORTHERN VIRGINIANS MOVING.

Northern Virginia jurisdictions and agencies were able to apply for NVTA regional funds during the official Call for Regional Transportation Projects (from July 1, 2021 – October 1, 2021).


- Eligible applicants: Region's counties, cities, five largest towns, transit agencies and other state/regional governmental entities
- All projects considered for regional revenues: Undergo comprehensive regional evaluation process

In anticipation of a high demand for regional revenues, applicants were encouraged to:

- Highlight how well their candidate projects complement one another and those in adjacent jurisdictions
- Consider NVTA's core values of equity, sustainability, and safety

Applications undergo thorough review and evaluation as part of the update process.



Taking you on a journey around NoVA: A multimodal approach to reducing congestion, getting you to your destination faster

30% Local Distribution Fund:

- Distributed monthly to individual NoVA jurisdictions
- Use of funds determined by each jurisdiction based on transportation needs and priorities

- Projects must meet one or more of the following statutorily defined purposes of:
 - Urban or secondary road construction;
 - Capital improvements that reduce congestion;
 - Other transportation capital improvements which have been approved by the most recent long-range transportation plan adopted by the Authority;
 - Public transportation purposes



PROJECT MILESTONES

As you travel around Northern Virginia, you'll be able to see your taxpayer dollars hard at work through multimodal investments coming to reality across the region.



JANUARY 25, 2021: NVTA joined the City of Alexandria and representatives from DASH Bus to celebrate the completion of three Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) projects located throughout the City, providing faster service and improved transit network reliability.

NVTA Regional Funding: Nearly \$2.2M



MAY 26, 2021: NVTA broke ground on the Route 28 Widening: Godwin Drive to the Southern City Limits project with the City of Manassas and Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT). This sole NVTA regionally-funded project in the City of Manassas will reduce congestion on a high-volume corridor that runs through the Cities of Manassas and Manassas Park and Counties of Prince William, Fairfax and Loudoun.

NVTA Regional Funding: Nearly \$3.3M



JUNE 18, 2021: NVTA, the Town of Hillsboro, Loudoun County and VDOT celebrated the reopening of the enhanced Route 9, addressing traffic congestion in this high-volume commuting route.

NVTA Regional Funding: \$12.1M



JUNE 28, 2021: NVTA, the Town of Leesburg, Loudoun County and VDOT cut the ribbon on the opening of the Route 7 at Battlefield Parkway Interchange in the Town of Leesburg. According to NVTA analysis, the Route 7 at Battlefield Parkway improvements are projected to save more than 2.5 million person-hours of delay by 2040.

NVTA Regional Funding: \$58M



AUGUST 11, 2021: NVTA joined OmniRide in celebrating the completion of the new Western Bus Maintenance & Storage Facility in Prince William County. Commuters will be provided new transit options and experience improved on-time performance through expanded bus capacity provided by OmniRide, as well as a new commuter bus service provided as part of the Transform 66 Outside the Beltway Project.



SEPTEMBER 17, 2021: NVTA joined Fairfax County and VDOT in celebrating the groundbreaking on the Route 28 Widening: Prince William County Line to Route 29 project, a Corridor of Statewide Significance. In total, NVTA has funded \$350 million in the Route 28 Corridor.

OCTOBER 7, 2021: NVTA, NOVA Parks and the City of Falls Church unveiled W&OD Trail enhancements, a significant step in reducing congestion and increasing capacity through non-motorized transportation investments for cyclists and pedestrians utilizing the busy pathway. The cycling community participated in the celebration and ribbon cutting.

NVTA Regional Funding: \$3.24M



NOVEMBER 5, 2021: NVTA joined Loudoun County and VDOT in celebrating the start of construction on Northstar Boulevard, Phase II, from Route 50 to Tall Cedars Parkway, part of the North/South Corridor of Statewide Significance, addressing congestion on parallel north/south routes between I-95 and Dulles International Airport and to connect travelers to activity centers in Loudoun County and beyond.




