**RESOLUTION 20-04 FINDING NEED TO CONDUCT MEETING BY ELECTRONIC
COMMUNICATION MEANS DURING GOVERNOR'S DECLARED STATE OF
EMERGENCY DURING COVID – 19 PANDEMIC**

SEPTEMBER 10, 2020 MEETING ELECTRONICALLY

September 10, 2020

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, the Governor of Virginia declared a state of emergency in Virginia in response to the spread of novel coronavirus, or COVID-19, a communicable disease of public health threat as so declared by the State Health Commissioner on February 7, 2020 (“COVID-19”); and

WHEREAS, in subsequent Executive Orders, particularly Executive Order Nos. 53 and 55, as amended, the Governor of Virginia, among other measures designed to ensure safe physical distancing between individuals, prohibited public and private in person gatherings of 10 or more individuals and ordered all individuals in Virginia to remain at their place of residence, with limited exceptions, to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 and prevent its spread; and

WHEREAS, the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority finds that it has a responsibility to demonstrate to the public, through the Authority’s conduct, the importance of maintaining proper physical distance from others and to avoid gathering in public where the risks of infection are highest, and to take measures that promote physical distancing in order to protect the public health and mitigate the impacts and spread of COVID-19, including, among others, conducting meetings electronically whenever possible; and

WHEREAS, on April 22, 2020, the Virginia General Assembly adopted, and the Governor signed, budget bill amendments to HB 29 that expressly authorize “any public body, including any state, local, [or] regional body” to “meet by electronic communication means without a quorum of the public body . . . physically assembled at one location when the Governor has declared a state of emergency . . . , provided that (i) the nature of the declared emergency makes it impracticable or unsafe for the public body . . . to assemble in a single location; (ii) the purpose of the meeting is to discuss or transact the business statutorily required or necessary to continue operations of the public body . . . and the discharge of its lawful purposes, duties, and responsibilities” among other provisions; and

WHEREAS, member jurisdictions of the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority have adopted continuity of government ordinances pursuant to Va. Code Ann. § 15.2-1413 which ordinances, among other provisions, contemplate regional bodies of which the locality is a member meeting electronically to transact business to assure the continuity of government; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority hereby finds that meeting by electronic means is authorized because the nature of the declared emergency makes it both impracticable and unsafe for the Authority to assemble in a single location on September 10, 2020, to discuss and transact the business of the Authority listed on the September 10, 2020 Authority Meeting Agenda; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Authority hereby finds that meeting by electronic means is authorized because the items on the September 10, 2020 Authority Meeting Agenda are statutorily required or necessary to continue operations of the Authority and the discharge of the Authority's lawful purposes, duties, and responsibilities; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the items on the September 10, 2020 Authority Meeting Agenda are encompassed within the continuity of operations ordinances adopted by member localities of the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority to assure the continued operation of the government during the disaster posed by the public health emergency resulting from COVID-19.

 - ✓ **Chair Randall called the meeting to order at 7:03 PM.**

2. **Roll Call** Chair Randall

3. **Adoption of Resolution 20-03 to Find Need to Conduct Meeting by Electronic Communication Means during Governor's declared State of Emergency during COVID-19 Pandemic** NVTA Council of Counsels

Recommended action: Adoption of Resolution 20-03 for Electronic Meetings During COVID-19 Pandemic

 - ✓ **Chair Randall made the motion to adopt Resolution 20-03 to Find the Need to Conduct Meeting by Electronic Communication Means during the Governor's declared State of Emergency during COVID-19 Pandemic; seconded by Board Member Cristol. Motion passed unanimously (14-0 vote).**

4. **Minutes of the June 11, 2020 Meeting**

Mayor Parrish moved approval of the June 11, 2020 minutes; seconded by Mayor Rishell. Motion passed with abstentions by Senator Boysko as she was not present for the previous meeting (13-0-1 vote).

Presentation

5. COVID-19: Transportation Impacts and Opportunities

Mr. Jasper, Principal Planner

Mr. Jasper introduced Mr. Roden (AECOM), Mr. Mumford (AECOM) and Ms. Volz (AECOM) and commenced the presentation on the impact of COVID-19 pandemic on Transportation, noting:

- ✓ Different recovery scenarios to compare impacts and the use of analysis to structure future planning efforts.
- ✓ Analyze plausible possible future scenarios and scenario development through modeling approaches.
- ✓ Recovery from COVID-19, trip behavior has been impacted starting in March 2020, and resulted in increased telework, closure of schools, and many businesses, a decrease in travel throughout the region and safety concerns regarding transit and shared-rides.
- ✓ Explained the National Trends of Working from Home Chart and Regional Trends of WMATA Ridership, where ridership declined 88% from Q4 FY2020 Budget.
- ✓ Mr. Jasper handed over the presentation to Mr. Roden, who explained the Northern Virginia Re-opening Phases:
 - Phase 1 (Started 5/29) – Continued social distancing and teleworking.
 - Phase 2 (Started 6/12) – Social gatherings increase to 50 people and restaurant offering indoor capacity at 50% occupancy.
 - Phase 3 (Started 7/1) – Limit occupancy of physical spaces and encourage telework.
 - Phase 4 (“New Normal”) – June 2021-2025
- ✓ Mr Roden explained the different scenarios, Quick Recovery, Active Transportation, Second Pandemic Wave in October, and Cautious Recovery and compared between Short-term (2020-2021) and New Normal (2025).
- ✓ He explained the Short-Term Impacts (Jan 2020 to June 2021), noting:
 - Impact on daily vehicle miles of travel;
 - Impact on vehicle miles traveled, where the Quick Recovery phase would be 94%;
 - Impact on daily transit ridership, which would take a long time to recover;
 - Impact on Person Hours of Delay, that increase in teleworking
 - He further added the Active Transportation compared to Pre-COVID levels where 60% trips less than 5 miles are walk/bike, and Mode Share increases 30%.
- ✓ He further explained about the “New Normal” Impacts (2025), noting:
 - To evaluate the scenarios using TransAction performance metrics.
 - Multi-modal measures that address accessibility and mobility in the region.

- Overall impact of cautious recovery scenario with weighted performance measures.
- ✓ Mr. Jasper summarized the “New Normal” observations using the four scenarios, noting:
 - 10-15 percent more telework than pre-COVID levels;
 - Reduction in auto and transit trips where;
 - “Active Transportation” scenario has the most significant impact for auto trips (46 percent reduction)
 - “Cautious Recovery” scenarios have the most significant effect for transit trips (37 percent reduction)
 - Reduction in person hours of delay, where;
 - ‘Cautious Recovery’ scenario has the most substantial impact (85 percent)
- ✓ Mr. Jasper concluded the presentation, noting:
 - Short-Term:
 - The majority of changes occur within the first 18 months and level off around June 2021.
 - New Normal - Teleworking and economic impacts result in:
 - Traffic Volumes and transit ridership do not fully recover to pre-COVID levels.
 - Significant reductions in time spent traveling and time lost in congestion.
 - Congestion reduction impacts are a positive, transit ridership reduction may be challenging to the financial stability of some transit agencies
- ✓ Mr. Jasper asked the Authority members for any questions or comments:
 - Council Member Snyder and Mayor Meyer commented that they would be interested in the long-term impact, which will be determined in the future.
 - Delegate Roem added that there might be an impact on residential development due to COVID-19 and added that Vehicle Miles Traveled is going to be more consistent than ridership on Mass Transit before a vaccine.
 - Ms. Hynes commented that 10-15 percent assumption of telework may eventually increase and that she wonders how the new normal would be and if this would change the mission.
 - Ms. Cuervo agreed with Ms. Hynes and added that as the road use is increasing, the 10-15 percent telework will be beneficial.
 - Mayor Parrish commented that there is more to be determined over time and added that teleworking is a good option.
 - Chair Randall noted that the telework number may go up significantly over time.

6. **Appointment of Daniel Robinson to the Council of Counsels**

Ms. Backmon, Executive Director

Recommended action: Appointment of Mr. Robinson to the Council of Counsels

- ✓ Ms. Backmon advised the Authority of Ms. Posner's retirement from Fairfax County noting Mr. Robinson has been designated by Fairfax County Attorneys as her replacement on the Council of Counsels.
- ✓ She further explained that the responsibilities of the Council of Counsels are to provide legal counsel and advice, legal support, and representation to the Authority.
- ✓ She thanked Ms. Posner for her tireless efforts on behalf of the Authority.
- ✓ She added that the Council of Counsels was established by the Authority on July 12, 2007 when Council Member Snyder was part of the legal working group.
- ✓ Chair Randall asked which jurisdictions do the other Council of Counsels members originated from. To which Ms. Backmon stated, that Mr. MacIsaac is from Arlington County, and Mr. Dickerson is from Prince William County.
- ✓ Chairman McKay thanked Ms. Posner for her service and leadership and welcomed Mr. Robinson to the Authority's Council of Counsels.
- ✓ Other Authority members expressed appreciation for Ms. Posner's years of service to the Authority, guidance, openness to resolving any issue.

Chairman McKay moved the approval of the appointment of Daniel Robinson to the NVTA Council of Counsels; seconded by Mayor Parrish. Motion passed unanimously (14-0 vote).

7. **Approval of the Withdrawal/Cancellation of the VRE Lorton and Rippon Station Projects**

Mr. Longhi, CFO

Recommended action: Approval of the Withdrawal/Cancellation of the Projects

Mr. Longhi summarized the presented staff report by noting:

- ✓ Withdrawal or Cancellation of the VRE Lorton and Rippon Station Projects was presented to the Finance Committee and received a unanimous recommendation.
- ✓ VRE staff reported they will present a project withdrawal recommendation to the VRE Operations Board in the July 10th dispatch for the July 17th meeting.
- ✓ If the VRE Operations Board takes action on July 17th to withdraw the projects, the project status will be recorded as voluntarily withdrawn instead of canceled.

- ✓ Mr. Longhi noted VRE is welcome to apply for additional projects in the future and opened the floor for any questions or comments.
- ✓ Chair Wheeler and Ms. Mitchell commented that the cancellation of VRE Lorton and Rippon Station Projects would free up revenue for other projects.
- ✓ Board Member Cristol mentioned that on behalf of the VRE Operations Board, she is happy to support this.
- ✓ She further noted that the members of the VRE Operations Board are very strongly supportive of the Franconia-Springfield Passenger Rail Bypass project, as it is a critical project to take advantage of the planned commuter rail track expansion and track acquisitions, which is an upcoming item to discuss in the Adoption of the FY2020-2025 Six Year Program.

Chair Wheeler moved Authority cancellation or acceptance of withdrawal of the VRE Lorton and Rippon Station Projects unencumbering a combined \$16.9 million in project funding; seconded by Chairman McKay. Motion passed unanimously (14-0 vote).

8. Adoption of the FY2020-2025 Six Year Program

Ms. Backmon, Executive Director

Recommended action: Adoption of the FY2020-2025 Six Year Program

- ✓ Ms. Backmon provided an overview of the NVTAs staff project funding recommendations and the Planning and Programming Committee (PPC) recommendations approved at their June 19, 2020, meeting.
- ✓ With the cancellation/withdrawal of VRE Lorton and Rippon Station Projects, the available revenue is increased to \$539 Million (\$522M was previously recommended by the Finance Committee and adopted by the Authority).
- ✓ Mayor Wilson, Chair of the PPC, stated that the PPC met on June 19, 2020 and endorsed the NVTAs Staff recommendations.
- ✓ He further added that the PPC unanimously recommended additional projects/funding up to \$16,958,821 with the withdrawal/cancellation of the two VRE projects consistent with the Finance Committee recommendation. The additional funding recommendations are:
 - \$700,000 - Jermantown Road/Route 29 Intersection Improvements (City of Fairfax);
 - \$8,300,000 - Downtown Falls Church Multimodal Improvements (City of Falls Church);
 - \$7,958,821 - Franconia-Springfield Passenger Rail Bypass (DRPT)
- ✓ He also added that the PPC commended NVTAs staff for the difficult decisions in prioritizing an extremely competitive round of funding.

Mayor Wilson moved Authority adoption of the FY2020 - 2025 Six Year Program.; seconded by Chair Randall. Motion passed unanimously (14-0 vote).

RESOLUTION NO. 2911

WHEREAS, the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority (NVTA) is a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia created by the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority Act, Chapter 25 of Title 33.2 of the Code of Virginia 1950, as amended; and

WHEREAS, the NVTA has established a Council of Counsels that includes counsel from Arlington, Fairfax County, Prince William County and Alexandria; and

WHEREAS, Christopher Spera, Deputy City Attorney was representing the City of Alexandria on the Council of Counsels and the position has been vacant since Mr. Spera's departure from the City in 2016; and

According to recent estimates, the project costs have increased due to market conditions. The estimate for the Route 29 Widening Phase I project has been reduced and the project no longer requires these funds.
- The RJACC recommended approval of the transfer request at the July 23, 2020 meeting.

4. Next steps. Upon Authority recommendation of approval, the transfer request will be sent to the Commonwealth Transportation Board to be included in their transfer report.



The Northern Virginia Transportation Authority (NVTA) recently appropriated \$2.2 million for FY 2021 for the West End Transitway (TransAction project #42). We appreciate the Authority's funding and appropriation for this high priority project. As discussed with NVTA in late 2018, the City is moving forward with the Phase 1 Transportation Systems Management (TSM) scenario along the entire corridor between Van Dorn Metrorail station and the Pentagon. In 2019, the City was successful in receiving an additional \$57.2 million in FY 2024-25 SMART SCALE funding toward the construction of the first phase focused on TSM improvements, stations, non-motorized improvements and buses.

The City is requesting that the \$2.2m of FY18-23 NVTA funds be appropriated starting in FY 2022, and that the full amount remain for Right-of-Way services. The City is currently in the procurement process for the design of the West End Transitway, and anticipates the design beginning in early 2021. We anticipate that Right-of-Way services will not begin until at least FY 2022. We intend to use the balance of the FY15-16 NVTA funds toward the project design. If the design bids come in higher than what is available in the FY15-16 fund balance, we will request the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) move up a portion of the FY 2024-25 Smart Scale funds. We are requesting that NVTA cancel the \$2.2m appropriation for FY2021, and re-appropriate the funds in FY2022, at which point we believe we will be able to begin Right-of-Way services. This will not change the project delivery schedule.

1. Purpose. To seek Northern Virginia Transportation Authority (NVTA) endorsement of Northern Virginia localities SMART SCALE project applications for funding consideration.

2. Suggested Motion: *I move Authority adoption of Resolution 20-05, Endorsement of Northern Virginia localities SMART SCALE Project Applications, for funding consideration in the Commonwealth of Virginia's SMART SCALE Prioritization Process.*

3. Background.

- SMART SCALE is the primary funding program for transportation projects using Commonwealth of Virginia revenues.
- Similar to the Authority's Six Year Program, SMART SCALE uses a biennial schedule and incorporates a data-driven process to screen and evaluate projects, and to prioritize investment decisions.
- The SMART SCALE program is now in its fourth round.
- While the deadline for submitting SMART SCALE applications for this fourth round was August 17, 2020, the deadline for submitting resolutions of support is October 30, 2020.
- An NVTA Resolution of support is needed for applications from transit agencies and localities that address an identified VTRANS need on a Corridor of Statewide Significance.

- Projects approved for SMART SCALE funding will be included in the Commonwealth's Six Year Improvement Program, to be adopted in June 2021, by the Commonwealth Transportation Board.
- Per the Authority's enabling legislation, the Authority recommends to the Commonwealth Transportation Board, priority regional transportation projects for receipt of federal and state funds.

4. Next steps. The Commonwealth will release project evaluations and funding recommendations in January 2021. It is anticipated that the Commonwealth Transportation Board will hold Public Hearings in March/April 2021, and will adopt the Six Year Improvement Program in June 2021.

RE: Update on the 2020 Virginia General Assembly Special Session

Purpose: To update the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority (NVTA) on the 2020 Virginia General Assembly Special Session.

The Special Session is moving along with a hope that the Senate Finance and Appropriations Committee and the House Appropriations Committee can provide budgets for full votes next week.

This session does not have many initiatives affecting transportation funding or operations of the Authority. However, a few issues have engaged Authority and local government liaisons.

Proposed changes regarding long term stays in transient housing

The Virginia Poverty Law Center (VPLC) sought a way to permit individuals using hotels/motels as permanent housing to receive rental assistance from local, state or federal sources. The proposal created doubt on whether the transient occupancy tax (TOT) would still be imposed and collected. (SB 5089-Locke and HB 5120 - Jenkins).

If true, this would remove a source of transportation funding for (1) the Metro Capital Fund and (2) transportation purposes for Prince William County, Manassas and Manassas Park.

Upon reflection and due to the numerous concerns raised Senator Locke withdrew her bill and HB 5120 looks like it will not be taken up.

Provisions Related to Joint Public Hearing of the Authority, NVTC and VDOT

The Northern Virginia Transportation Commission (NVTC) is pursuing a budget language amendment that would allow the Authority, NVTC, CTB and VRE and to hold the annual joint public meeting (HB 1285 (2018), remotely due to Governor Northam's state of emergency declaration that makes it unsafe to meet in person.

Delegate Rip Sullivan has submitted the language for consideration.

The Budget

At this time the Senate and House do not look like they will have budgets ready for full floor votes until next week.

The proposed budget language amendments from the administration do not seem to be in jeopardy. These amendments provide flexibility in how the Commonwealth Transportation Board mitigates the impact of lower transportation revenue.

The General Assembly members are not expressing concern about the transportation flexibility language but may ask that the Secretary or Commonwealth and Transportation Board provide information on how the flexibility is used.

SUBJECT: Executive Director's Report

Purpose: To inform the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority (NVTA) of items of interest not addressed in other agenda items.

1. **W&OD Trail Enhancements Groundbreaking in City of Falls Church** – On August 26, 2020, NVTA joined the City of Falls Church and NOVA Parks to celebrate the start of construction on a nearly 1.5-mile-long segment of the W&OD Trail. The Authority is funding more than \$3.24 million in this regionally significant project through the FY2018-23 Six Year Program.
2. **Virginia Transit Association Virtual Event Presentation** – On August 21, 2020, I participated in a “Nimble Transit Network Planning” virtual event hosted by the Virginia Transit Association. I presented on the Authority’s Six Year Program Adoption, transit investments in the region, and impacts of COVID-19 on transportation, according to our recent analysis in collaboration with AECOM. Fellow panelists included Jennifer DeBruhl, Chief of Public Transportation, Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT), and Martin Barna, Director of Planning & Scheduling, DASH Bus.
3. **Northern Virginia Chamber of Commerce Annual State of Transportation Presentation** – On August 5, 2020, I joined fellow panelists Shannon Valentine, Virginia Secretary of Transportation, and Kate Mattice, Executive Director, Northern Virginia Transportation Commission (NVTC), to discuss the state of transportation in Northern Virginia and the Commonwealth of Virginia. I discussed the Authority’s investments in a regional multimodal network, COVID-19’s impacts on transportation, the adoption of the FY2020-2025 Six Year Program, and the update to TransAction.
4. **NVTA in the News** – Through proactive media outreach efforts and campaigns, the Authority has received significant news coverage as of late. For instance, though the Six Year Program Virtual Media Briefing NVTA hosted July 10, 2020, and a collaborative effort

with the Joint Regional PIO Group, more than 40 media placements were secured on the FY2020-2025 Six Year Program Adoption. Additionally, through targeted press outreach, print, radio and television placements were secured on the COVID-19 Analysis in partnership with AECOM; those placements included INSIDE NOVA, WTOP and Fox 5. Lastly, through multiple deskside briefings and conversations, I will be featured in a Washington Business Journal Executive Profile in an upcoming edition of the print/online publication.

5. Capital COVID Survey: Return to Work (Powered by the Greater Washington Partnership and EY) – NVTA joined the Greater Washington Partnership, MWCOG, WMATA, NVTC, MDOT, and other leading business organizations in launching the Capital COVID Survey: Return to Work. As the COVID-19 pandemic continues, the Greater Washington Partnership, which is leading this initiative, has heard directly from employers and transportation agencies across the region that they need better insight into how and when organizations are planning to reopen worksites, and how employers feel about the ability of transit agencies to safely return employees to worksites. NVTA shared the survey with the Joint Regional PIO Group, asking the group to share with their jurisdictions/agencies, as well as partners in the business community. Additionally, NVTA promoted the survey on social media. The deadline to submit survey feedback was August 28, 2020. Each organization, agency and jurisdiction that completed this survey will receive a summary of the survey results, transit agency ridership information and crowding trends for all Washington metro area agencies (e.g., WMATA, VRE, MARC, etc.), and projections for the upcoming month that are aimed at supporting key reopening decisions.

6. NVTA Standing Committee Meetings:

- **Finance Committee:** The NVTA Finance Committee is scheduled to meet next on September 17th at 1:00pm. The meeting will held electronically.
- **Planning and Programming Committee:** The NVTA Planning and Programming Committee is TBD.
- **Governance and Personnel Committee:** The next meeting of the NVTA Governance and Personnel Committee is scheduled for the fall of 2020. Exact date TBD.

7. NVTA Statutory Committee Meetings:

- **Technical Advisory Committee:** The NVTA Technical Advisory Committee is scheduled to meet September 16th at 7:00pm. Please note that the meeting may be held electronically. The meeting will be held electronically.
